Medical Notes

Chronic Pain

Pain that lasts more than a few months is considered "chronic" or on-going. Chronic pain can seem overwhelming, but does not have to dominate your every thought or move. However, there are no easy fixes. Opiates (narcotics) work better for acute pain, pain that is short duration of usually less than a month. Opiates have side effects and problems that limit their usefulness for chronic pain.

There are invasive procedures that can be used to control pain; nerve-blocking injections, implanted devices to deliver anesthetics directly to the spine, and surgery. The Chronic Pain Association has a new catch-phrase if nothing seems to work: "Don't tell me to live with it, teach me how to do it".

Pain management is a team sport and you are the key player. Pain management involves finding a combination of strategies that work for **you**. It is best to adopt the attitude that "This is my pain and I need to own it if I want to get better."

Medication-free options include:

- Physical reconditioning such as physical therapy, stretching exercises, and weight lifting.
- Mind-based treatments such as cognitive behavioral therapy, biofeedback, and hypnosis.
- Stress management techniques like meditation.

The most effective techniques will vary for each individual. Movement is the most essential element even if it is just walking three minutes a day with a gradual increase. Weight loss has been found to be the most valuable modification for many chronic pain issues because it relieves the burden of additional weight on the joints. Your doctor's office should be able to start you in the right direction.

Residents of the Month



Oscar and Christine have been selected 'Residents of the Month' for September. They both were raised in very large, wholesome, hard working families. Oscar was born in the farming community of Hosmer, South Dakota and had twelve siblings. Everyone in the family helped on the family farm starting at a young age. The family endured many hardships on the farm; the great depression, the 1933 dustbowl, and the 120 degree summers of 1935 and 1936. In 1931 a hail-storm destroyed the crops and his dad had to hire out Oscar and his older siblings to other farmers. Oscar's school had one room and one teacher, he had to quit high school because he was needed on the farm.

Christine was born in the Columbia River town of Rainier, Oregon. She had eight siblings. Her father was a carpenter and her mother took care of the home. Her mother canned a thousand quarts of fruit, vegetables and salmon every year. Christine and her siblings helped with her father's business, making cedar fishnet floats called corks. She recalls that her mom always had the coffee on for company and the kids would play cricket and hide and seek outside until dark. She spent her school years in Rainier, then went to work at Evans Products Company in Coos Bay, Oregon.

Oscar was drafted on his twenty-first birthday and served in Europe for twenty-two months. His MOS was army ordinance (small arms repair). He was discharged Christmas Eve 1945 from Camp McCoy, Wisconsin. He then went to work at Evans Products Company in Coos Bay, Oregon. He met Christine by chance on a blind date through mutual friends at work. Shortly after, on November 11, 1946 they were married. In 1960 they moved to Corvallis where Oscar transferred to the Evans Products Company in Corvallis and Christine took care of their home.

In 1961 Oscar and Christine opened a Western Auto store in The Dalles, Oregon. Three years later they moved back to Corvallis and Oscar went on to be the sales manager for the battery separator division at Evans Products. They have two sons; Dan and Tom and three grandchildren. After retirement they both enjoyed being at home doing yard-work and gardening, having barbeques and playing cards and games with friends. Oscar's favorite place to visit is Silver Creek Falls and Christine just loves to be home. They also enjoy going for walks and watching television; Christine likes game shows and good wholesome movies and Oscar likes sports, especially the OSU Beavers. If you ask Oscar how he is doing today, he will probably say "It could be better, it could be worse, or it could be a lot worse." Christine's favorite words are from John 3:16. They are both very devoted to their Christian faith. Oscar likes the care and patience the hard working Timberhill Place staff give to him and Christine as well as the food. Christine likes their friends, staff, food, activities and the harmony and peace here at Timberhill Place.
